I shall never forget the words of my mother when I left to go on a mission sixty-odd years ago, when she said to me, "When you were a lad you often had bad dreams. You remember you would call out from your room and say, 'Mother, are you there?' And I would say, 'Yes, son, I am here. Every-thing's all right. Turn over and go to sleep.'" She said, "Now, my boy, you are going on a mission. You will be 5.000 miles away from me and I can't answer your call, but many times you will need to ask someone, 'Are you there?' Now," she said, "while you are gone, and the rest of your life, whatever happens, don't forget to call out and say, 'Father, are you there?' And I promise you, my boy, if you will do that, he will respond to you. You may not hear his voice; you will not see his form or figure, but you will know he is there, and he will support vou."

T hear you my witness tonight that many times in intervening years I have called out to him for help, and I have needed it all the time. I needed it at the beginning of this conference. I called out to him and said, "Father, are you there?" I bear witness that he answered. He has been with us through this conference. We have had a glorious time.

I leave you my testimony of the divinity of this work. I know it better than I know anything else, and I thatk God for the privilege of working in it. I pray that all of you, my brethren that you can get just as close to your Heavenly Tather as you can understate to live rightrougly, to talk to him regularly, and to obey his commandments. I leave you my witness and pray that God will bless you.
